










James Simon, BA, DDS (USA)







Ilan Rotstein, DDS (USA)

Associate Professor of Endodontics and Chair, Division of Surgical, Therapeutic and Bioengineering Sciences and Associate Dean for Continuing Oral Health Professional Education at the USC School of Dentistry, Los Angeles, California. Dr. Rotstein is Chair of the Research Committee of the International Federation of Endodonitc Associations and past member of the Research and Scientific Affairs Committee of the American Association of Endodontists. Dr. Rotstein has published over 100 scientific articles and research abstracts in the dental literature as well as chapters in international endodontic textbooks. He has lectured extensively both nationally and internationally. Topic: Outcome of Endodontic Therapy - The Ultimate Frontier

Jorgen Slots, DMD, DDS, PhD, MS, MBA (USA)

Dr. Slots is Professor of Dentistry and Microbiology at USC School of Dentistry. He graduated from the Royal Dental College, Copenhagen, Denmark in 1969. In 1976 he completed his Postgraduate Education in Periodontology at the Royal Dental College in Copenhagen, and in 1977 obtained a Certificate in Microbiology from the Forsyth Dental Center, Boston, MA. He obtained a D.M.D. degree in 1987 and an M.B.A degree in 1989 from the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Slots has served as Chair of the Dept. of Oral Microbiology at the University of Goteborg in Sweden (1982-1986), Chair of Periodontology at the USC School of Dentistry (1991-2001) and Associate Dean for Research at the USC School of Dentistry (1990-2000). Since 1991 he has served as Head of the Oral Microbiology Testing Laboratory. He is a member of many national and international professional and scientific societies and was awarded with numerous distinguished awards in periodontology and dental research. He is the Editor-in-Chief of three leading dental journals: Oral Microbiology and Immunology, Periodontology 2000 and Journal of Periodontal Research. He has published more than 300 articles and textbook chapters in periodontology, implantology, microbiology, immunology and molecular biology and has lectured extensively in the United States and around the world.

Topic: Changing Views on Endodontic Infections

Richard E. Walton, DMD, MS (USA)

A native of the Pacific Northwest, Dr. Walton earned a DMD at the University of Oregon in 1965. After two years in the Army, he trained at the University of Illinois to obtain a Certificate in Endodontics and an MS in Histology. Since 1983, Dr. Walton has been Professor of Endodontics at the University of Iowa College of Dentistry and was Chair from 1983 to 1996. He also was on the faculty at the University of Connecticut and the Medical College of Georgia. Dr. Walton is a Diplomate of and has been an Examiner on the American Board of Endodontics. He was Editor of the Endodontic Section of *Triple O* and has published numerous scientific and clinical articles and has contributed extensively to Ingle's Endodontics as well as to Pathways of the Pulp and to Contemporary Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. Dr. Walton coauthors a textbook, Principles and Practice of Endodontics now published as a third edition and translated into several languages. In 1997, the Iowa Alumni Association recognized Dr. Walton as Educator of the Year. Dr. Walton received the Louis I. Grossman Award for research contributions by the American Association of Endodontists in 2001. In 2004, a University of Iowa Endowed Professorship was established in his name. Also in 2004, Dr Walton was recognized by the President's Club by receiving the James H. McLeran Faculty Award

C. John Munce, DDS (USA)

Dr. Munce is a Diplomate of the American Board of Endodontics and an Assistant Professor of Graduate Endodontics at both Loma Linda University and the University of Southern California. Clinical concepts and techniques originated by Dr. Munce have been published in a number of primary endodontic textbooks, most recently in the 9th edition of Pathways of the Pulp. He holds patents on several unique endodontic instruments, and has been a design consultant for a number of clinical endodontic products. Dr. Munce maintains a private endodontic practice in Santa Barbara, California with an emphasis on endodontic management of teeth with severe coronal-radicular breakdown, canal obstructions, and other complexities.

Topic: Management of Hard-To-Save Teeth

William P. Saunders, DDS (Scotland)



Graduated in 1970 and spent five years in the Royal Air Force before entering general dental practice as a Principal for six years. He then embarked upon an academic career with higher training in Restorative Dentistry. He was appointed the first Professor of Endodontology in the UK in 1993, first at the University of Glasgow then, in 2000, at the University of Dundee where he was appointed Dean of Dentistry and Head of Department in the same year. Research interests include broad aspects of Endodontology and applied Dental Materials. Clinical interests include surgical and nonsurgical root canal retreatment and restoration of the root filled tooth. Dr. Saunders has been President of the British Endodontic Society and is currently Chairman of the Education Committee of the European Society of Endodontology. He was Editor of the International Endodontic Journal for seven years from 1991-1998 and is now a Consultant Editor. He is on the refereeing panel for a number of peer-reviewed journals and sits on the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh Dental Faculty. He was recently appointed President-elect of the European Society of Endodontology and will host the biennial meeting in Edinburgh in 2009.

Markus Haapasalo, DDS, PhD (Canada)

Dr. Haapasalo received his dental degree from the Faculty of Dentistry of the University of Helsinki, Finland in 1978. He received his PhD (Dr. Odont.) from the University of Helsinki in 1986 on the microbiology of endodontic infections, and completed his specialization in endodontics in 1987. He has taught and practiced endodontics in private practice and at the university. Since 1995, he has been a Professor of Endodontics and, since 1999, the Head of the Endodontic Department and Director of the Postgraduate Program in Endodontics (from 2001), Faculty of Dentistry Oslo, Norway. From 2004 he started in a new position as the Head of the Division of Endodontics, Department of Oral Medical and Biological Sciences, Faculty of Dentistry, University of British Columbia, Canada. Dr. Haapasalo has authored or coauthored over 80 scientific articles in peer-reviewed journals. He serves on the Editorial Board of International Endodontic Journal, and as a referee in several other scientific journals. He is the editor of the Visual Endodontics & Traumatology multimedia program. Dr. Haapasalo has received teaching awards and is actively lecturing about endodontics world-wide. Topic: Internal and Cervical Resorption: Pathogenesis, Diagnosis and Treatment

Douglas Daws, DDS (USA)

Associate Professor of Clinical Endodontics, Division of Surgical, Therapeutic and Bioengineering Sciences at the University of Southern California School of Dentistry, Los Angeles. He received his dental degree from the University of Southern California in 1984 and also obtained his endodontics certificate in 1991 from USC School of Dentistry. Dr. Daws lectures frequently on topics such as endodontic retreatment, apical surgery and management of difficult endodontic cases. He maintains a private practice limited to Endodontics in Glendale, California. Topic: Management of Calcified Canals

Gary B. Carr, DDS (USA)



Dr. Carr, widely recognized as the "Father of Microscopic Endodontics," has been practicing endodontics for 25 years in San Diego, CA. Dr. Carr has trained over 600 endodontists and their staffs in microsurgical and retreatment techniques and is the Director and Founder of the Pacific Endodontic Research Foundation (PERF). He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Endodontists and a Specialist Member of the American Association of Endodontists. Dr. Carr is also the creator and developer of TDO – The Digital Office – a digital practice management software for endodontists. 




